

Recycled Cardboard Shipping Boxes

At **Treasures of Light**, we continually look for ways to reduce landfill waste. Corrugated cardboard is a 100%-recyclable resource. We will ship your stained glass in a recycled cardboard box whenever one is available in the required size and strength.

After unpacking your glass and checking that it is free from any shipping damage, we encourage you to flatten the box and deposit it at your local recycling center.

Recycled Packing Materials

We also use recycled styrene board, air cushions, and packing peanuts wherever possible.

Please don't feed peanuts to the landfills! Mail Boxes, Etc.® (known in some locations as The UPS Store™) will accept clean packing peanuts at most of their locations, nationwide.

Stained Glass Care & Safety

Care and Maintenance

Dust your stained glass regularly using a lint-free cloth. Streaks and smudges may be removed using Windex® or an equivalent non-streak glass cleaner.

If your stained glass is on display in a kitchen or other food preparation area, it may develop a thin layer of oils that should first be removed with a mild solution of detergent and warm water, followed by a non-streak glass cleaner.

Safety

ALL GLASS IS BREAKABLE, regardless of its color, and care should be taken in handling. It is important for reasons of personal safety and long life of this product that you display it and care for it properly.

A drop or knock against a hard object may cause immediate breakage or enough damage so that the item breaks later for no apparent reason.

A severe impact can shatter the item immediately, resulting in many small pieces of glass, including tiny splinters that can become embedded in the skin and/or eyes, causing severe personal injury. Be careful in handling broken glass as it is always sharp and should be considered dangerous.

Always wear safety glasses to prevent eye injury when cleaning up broken glass. Carefully vacuum the entire room to get rid of glass splinters that may have become broadcast over a wide area.

Stained glass is fitted together with a metal alloy containing lead. Lead is known to cause personal injury when taken internally. Keep stained glass items out of reach of children. Wash hands thoroughly with soap and water after handling items.

Stained glass items should be displayed in a location where they will always be out of the reach of children. Use an adequate stand, hanger, or other method of displaying the glass so there is never the danger of it being handled by children, bumped, shaken, exposed to strong draughts, knocked over by a pet, or otherwise damaged so that it might become a hazard. Never display stained glass outdoors.

We do not recommend trusting any stained glass panel over 7" square to a suction cup hook. When using a suction cup hook, first wash the window using Windex® or an equivalent non-streak glass cleaner, then run warm water over the suction cup to soften the plastic. Attach the cup to the glass and wait four hours for it to form a stable bond before hanging your stained glass from the hook.
